### 3. Briefly describe its aims and objectives

This paper outlines the work which is underway and proposed to support those who are being impacted by the emerging cost of living crisis. It sets out the current position with regards to the Household Support Fund, developing areas of concern which are emerging and proposed next steps.

The Council has been already taken steps to support communities and groups affected by the emerging cost of living crisis. It is drawing on its own resources alongside central government support distributed through Gloucestershire County Council (GCC).

Looking forward, the strain on communities and on the resources across statutory and nonstatutory agencies is set to increase significantly. A requirement for ongoing central government support seems likely and may be distributed directly or through local infrastructures.

### 4. Are there external considerations? (Legislation / government directive, etc)

Yes – Second Tier councils have been asked by distribute funding and provide support for those effected by cost of living pressures.

### 5. Who is intended to benefit from it and in what way?

Residents across the Stroud District, especially those in more vulnerable groups who could be supported by SDC, health and care providers and by their local voluntary and community organisations.

### 6. What outcomes are expected?

To reduce the impact of cost of living pressures on Stroud District residents.

### 7. What evidence has been used for this assessment?: (eg Research, previous consultations, Inform (MAIDEN); Google assessments carried out by other Authorities)

The Council is using data and local intelligence to target groups and individuals who may be most vulnerable to cost-of-living pressures. However, this is an unusual situation and there may be unknown factors which are yet to emerge. The position is therefore under ongoing review.

### 8. Has any consultation been carried out?

This council paper has been written in consultation with partners who are supporting Stroud District in this emerging situation. This includes Town and Parish Councils, voluntary sector community hubs, registered housing providers and statutory partners such as the police and allied health professionals.

Age	Positive – Both young people and older people are likely to be adversely affected by cost of living pressures. Some support will be targeted at groups that are younger in families and of pension age.		
Disability	Positive – The County Council has recommended that we target some of this support towards people living with disabilities or long-term conditions. They anticipate that the cost of living will impact on them adversely.		
Gender Re- assignment	Neutral – we have no data on vulnerability in this cost of living crisis relating to gender reassignment specifically.		
Pregnancy & Maternity	Positive – Pregnant and new mothers are likely to be adversely affected by cost of living pressures. Some support will be targeted at these groups through help for families.		
Race	Positive – Our BAME population is not being specifically targeted by this programme, however the district council is on the forefront of work to support refugees and those resettled in the district from outside the UK. Networks supporting these groups are closely involved in this work.		
Religion – Belief	Neutral – we have no data on vulnerability relating to religion specifically.		
Sex	Positive - There is some evidence that mothers will be more adversely affected by the cost of living compared to men, as they tend to earn less and will feed their families before themselves. Some support will be targeted at families.		
Sexual Orientation	Neutral – we have no data on vulnerability in this cost of living crisis relating to sexual orientation specifically.		
Marriage & Civil Partnerships (part (a) of duty only)	Neutral		
Rural considerations: le Access to services; transport; education; employment; broadband;	Positive – Rural populations are at risk for a number of reasons, where access to services, community networks and public transport may be more difficult. We are working with rural parish and town councils to help ensure that support is targeted at their communities.
