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1. <u>Test and Trace Support Scheme</u>

- 1.1 Eligibility for a £500 Test and Trace Support Payment is restricted to people who:
 - are on a low income
 - have been told to stay at home and self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace, either because they have tested positive for coronavirus or have recently been in close contact with someone who has tested positive;
 - are employed or self-employed;
 - are unable to work from home and will lose income as a result; and
 - are currently receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and/or Pension Credit.

2. Discretionary payment

- 2.1 Local authorities can make a £500 discretionary payment to individuals who:
 - are on a low income
 - have been told to stay at home and self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace, either because they have tested positive for coronavirus or have recently been in close contact with someone who has tested positive;
 - are employed or self-employed; and
 - are unable to work from home and will lose income as a result.
- 2.2 In addition, the discretionary payment is for people:
 - who <u>are not</u> currently receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and/or Pension Credit; and
 - who are on low incomes and will face financial hardship as a result of not being able to work while they are self-isolating.
- 2.3 For both the Test and Trace Support Payment and discretionary payments, eligible individuals will receive their £500 payment on top of any benefits and Statutory Sick Pay (SSP) that they currently receive.

3. Application Process

- 3.1 Arrangements have been put in place to process and verify applications, issue payments to successful applicants and prevent and detect fraud.
- 3.2 SDC has its own online application system and an alternative system for non-digital users (a paper form that will be available upon request or an application can be completed over the phone).
- 3.3 To apply, applicants will complete the online form (or a telephone application if digitally excluded) and provide SDC with:
 - A notification from NHS Test and Trace asking them to self-isolate:
 - Proof of receipt of one of the qualifying benefits:
 - A bank statement; and
 - Proof of employment or, if they are self-employed, evidence of self-assessment returns, trading income and proof that their business delivers services which cannot be undertaken without social contact.
- 3.4 Once this evidence has been verified and the correct proofs provided, SDC will pay the applicant £500. This payment should be made within three working days of receiving a completed application.

4. Recommendation

4.1 The scheme is adopted and implemented by Stroud District Council with immediate effect.
